Prioritizing our Children:

1977: On March 6, the Fellowship began providing child care ("babysitting") for the first time during services. Providing child care during Sunday services, choir practices, and meetings has been a priority of our fellowship for a long time.

1985:

The first mention was made to include the children in the beginning part of the adults' program each week. "In addition to our regular responsive reading, we will be using a reading on Unitarian-Universalism from the hymnal, intended as a statement for all ages of what we are all about. Also, we are going to try having a short story each week, hopefully something of interest to children of all ages."

1990:

3-11-90: The first joint ministerial candidate for the Hanska and Mankato UU congregations, Rev. Mary Kapper, was approved by both congregations on March 11, 1990. Rev. Kapper was our joint minister for only the 1990-91 church year.
